PRESIDENT'S LETTER

What are you doing? If you're like most people the answer is "too much." There are family responsibilities, 40-hour workweeks, and (hopefully) eight hours of sleep. It's amazing we find time to brush our teeth.

But if when you like something, you find the time for it. I'm hoping that you like the Historical Society of Mount Lebanon because we are always in need of volunteers.

This spring the society—in cooperation with the Mt. Lebanon School District, the Mt. Lebanon Public Library and Pittsburgh History & Landmarks Foundation—will, once again, host the second grade walking tours of Washington Road. These tours take students from the library up Washington Road to Clearview Common and back. Along the way tour guides point out interesting architectural details and explain how the community has changed over the years. Being a tour guide is fun and interesting—the kids are well behaved (there are adult chaperones as well) and ask lots of great questions. In addition, being a tour guide only takes a few hours—you'll be done before lunch—and you'll be amazed at how much you'll learn about your community. Tour guides do not have to be long-time residents and are given training and scripts. This spring there will be seven sessions running April 25 through June 4. The Society's Oral History committee has list of more residents than they have time to interview. If you like chatting with people, consider signing on. We'll give you some training and then arm you with a notepad, questions, and tape recorder. Then you make an appointment at your leisure. You'll learn about how our community developed and what life was like 50, 60, or 70 years ago; the Society will get a valuable record of the past for its archives. We also need people

who can take a few hours to transcribe the tapes to paper. Having these histories on paper will make it easier to access information.

The Society's Home History Project—which invites residents to come to the library to learn more who built and designed their homes—has also been a huge success. In fact, it's booked pretty much through the year. We need people who can help—maybe one or two evenings per month (or more if you'd like). Once again, we'll train you. Now here's a fun one—do you like to take pictures? Well, the Society's "Then and Now" photo collection desperately needs to be updated. If you have a camera (digital or film), we can give you copies of the pictures and locations. You pick a nice day to go out and snap a shot of what that location looks like now. Finally, as we move closer to our goal of opening a history center, we are gathering names of people interested in helping out at the center. At this point, Society trustees are thinking of opening the center two days and one evening per week, and perhaps a few hours on the weekend. We aren't sure yet, because we don't know how many volunteers we'll have to staff the facility. Volunteers would be needed to greet visitors, answer questions, and show people around. The space is small, so it's not going to involve a lot of footwork. We will also be looking for people to help with odd jobs—such as stuffing envelopes and cataloging items—as well as set up (i.e., painting and moving boxes in). RESEARCH THE HISTORY OF YOUR MOUNT LEBANON HOME!

Ever wondered who built your home? Ever wondered who designed the original plans? With the value of the architecture and design of Mt. Lebanon homes—most built in the early years of the last century—being rediscovered and recognized, the Historical Society of Mt. Lebanon is joining with the Mt. Lebanon Public Library to assist residents in finding out who built and designed their homes. Because the records are fragile and irreplaceable, Historical Society trustee and Cultural Resource Survey volunteer Lori Humphreys and Society trustee Wilma Novogradac will be at the library twice each month to help you research the information. Please call the library at 412-531-1912 to make an appointment as the schedule may change. NOTE: If your house was built before 1924, there will **not** be a Building Permit Number, which makes obtaining the information about your home more difficult to find.

WE GOT THE GRANT!

Mt. Lebanon Historical Society has received a \$5,000 Department of Community and Economic Development grant through state Rep. Matt Smith's office.

The money will be used to buy computer equipment for the Society's History Center when it opens in the stucco building on the corner of Washington Road and Lebanon Avenue later this year. This equipment and software will be invaluable in helping us catalog the society's collection.
