**PRESIDENT'S LETTER:** The New Year offers us a chance to start fresh. And that's just what The Historical Society of Mount Lebanon is going to do.

After the doom and gloom of my last President's Letter, I am happy to announce much rosier news. After 15 months of "negotiating" with the Parking Authority and South Hills Area Council of Governments (SHACOG), the Society signed a lease on October 30 and started moving into our new facility at 200 Lebanon Avenue November 1.

Needless to say, the last two months have been very busy. We have been moving in furniture and boxes, cleaning, painting, and doing all the other things necessary to be ready for the public.

While most of our items are now in the center, we still need to obtain an occupancy permit, set up computers, and install a phone line and FiOs Internet service. We also need to catalog our items and make sure they are properly stored and displayed. A special committee consisting of Society board members and volunteers from the Senator John Heinz History Center will handle the cataloging. Depending on the number of volunteers we have for this task, it could take a few weeks or a few months to get everything into our databases. Thanks to a DCED grant, we have purchased the PastPerfect software, which was designed specifically for museums. The software can catalog up to one million items, including oral histories and photographs and also tracks loans, membership, donations, fund-raising endeavors, and pledges. In addition, the software can create letters (such as thank you notes and deed of gift forms) and provide detailed information about where every item is stored. The software was expensive, but will be worth it.

We also need to get a committee set up to run the center, figure out volunteer schedules, and work on displays. The Society board hopes that by the end of February we can start making plans for our grand opening. In November, I was distressed to hear that the Mt. Lebanon commissioners had decided not to fund the Society for 2009. Several newspapers ran articles about the cut, which spurred some residents (including me) to speak in favor of funding the Society at a commission budget meeting and to send letters of support. Even so, I was (pleasantly) surprised when on December 8 I found out that the commissioners had put the Society back into the budget for 2009. I would like to thank the commissioners and everyone who supported us.

That said, the Society still needs many items to get the center up and running as we now have monthly rent, insurance, and utility bills to pay. We rely heavily on membership dues to keep us moving forward and to fund the programs we currently host and help us create new ones. So, although I feel bad asking for money at this time of economic turmoil, I unfortunately must. At the end of November, we sent out a **membership renewal letter**, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has already renewed and ask those of you who have not, to please do so now. If you do, you will save the Society the expense of mailing a reminder letter. Your membership will help us create a quality history center and ensure we can keep our doors open for years to come.

Thank you...and a happy, healthy 2009 to everyone.
